shows by developing his famous and somewhat egocentric stage personae.

You may already know both Kinks' concerts which were broadcasted by the BBC in the 70s. Here you will hear the parts of these performances not available on the official release. "Father Christmas" is the only song which was never released on bootleg before. All the others from the so-called "Kristmas Koncert" have been re-broadcasted, but this song had been available only on video tape before and so our recording is from an other source than the rest. This is the reason why we changed the tracklist. "You Really Got Me" was played at the end in the original concert. The show is nearly completely assembled here, the only missing song is "Get Back In Line" which can be found on the official "BBC Sessions".

By moving to Columbia Records in the 90s The Kinks hoped to get some radio airplay again. At least some BBC TV shows featured them promoting their new album "Phobia". But without Columbia giving earnest support the CD failed. Nevertheless the Kinks (with a session guitarist instead of Dave Davies) entered the studios again in the beginning of 1994 to record another radio session.

Back Where We Started

After the tour in 1993/4 the band played before an invited audience at Konk studios and released parts of it on "To The Bone". To promote this album, they played their last BBC session to date at the Emma Freud Show. It is funny to hear how Ray reacted to the questions of his host who seemed to be badly prepared.

There are a lot of BBC songs missing here. Maybe there will be enough stuff for another compilation in the future. But

The Songs We Sang For Auntie

As mentioned above, this was the proposed title of the official CD, which unfortunately does

without great recordings such as "Sunny Afternoon", "A Well Respected Man", "Mr. Pleasant" or "Autumn Almanac". We have included them here. Some of the songs on the first CD may sound very similar to the versions on the official



2CD set, but listen carefully: "You Really Got Me", "Milk Cow Blues" and "Love Me Till The Sun Shines" are alternate BBC takes.

The most interesting tracks on this CD are "Hide And Seek" (erroneously titled "All Aboard" on various older bootlegs) and "Mirror Of Love". The BBC studio version of the latter has never appeared on a Kinks bootleg yet and "Hide And Seek" was never officially released by The Kinks.

Among the recordings which haven't managed to surface on the official CD are also "Marathon" and "Got To Be Free". They have been sorted out because Ray Davies has played them as solo tunes exclusively for the TV Play "The Long Distance Piano Player" (although the official CD includes "This Strange Effect", another Ray-only recording). Two other songs, "Mr. Churchill Says" and "Victoria", are both the known album version with new vocals.

Tales Told By Mr. Wonderful

According to keyboarder John Gosling, it was his idea to add the song "Mr. Wonderful" to the live set in the beginning of the 70s. He originally intended to caricature Ray Davies who then began to be the undisputed centre of their

The BBC Sessions Outtakes 1964-1994

In 2001 The Kinks released their "BBC Sessions" as a 2CD set – at last. For many years announcements had heralded a possible release to no avail. But in late 2000 a British mail-order presented the first draft of the proposed track list which included no less than 60 tracks and promised a whole career-spanning release. Unfortunately this didn't materialize: The official "BBC Sessions" only covers the period from 1964-1977, but even with regards to this time span the 2CD set is far from being complete; which gives us more than one reason for a compilation of outtakes like this one, and

so you will find a lot of the songs which were omitted from the official release.

"The Songs We Sang For Auntie" was the working title of the official release but it was skipped at the last minute. So we felt free to use it here where the BBC cannot forbid the use of the word "auntie".

When you listen to the CDs closely you may understand why these songs failed to get on the official record. Their sound quality leaves something to be desired. Some of the tracks have only been

accessible on private video or poor quality audio tapes, but we were determined to get our hands on all known tracks no matter how unconvincing their quality may be. Thus, we included "I Am Free" (with a cut at the end), "Got To Be Free", "Marathon" (both transferred from video tape) or "Got My Feet On The Ground" (varying sound).

You might already know the BBC takes assembled here since most of them have been available on previous bootleg CDs. We have made every effort to collect these scattered pieces of the Kinks' BBC performances in order
